English 1 Prep Course Syllabus 2021-2022 Notre Dame Preparatory High School

Course Description:

English 1

2 semesters - 1 credit

Placement determined by admissions portfolio.

This course is designed to strengthen students' critical reading, writing, speaking, and listening skills through the study of both American and world literature. The curriculum integrates informational texts and technology projects to create a blended learning environment. Students will be taught the Jane Schaffer writing method. Additional emphasis is placed on identifying individual and common writing weaknesses and solving and addressing those weaknesses. Mastery of the key elements of the literary genres, short stories, drama, poetry, and non-fiction is emphasized. The basics of research and research writing following MLA style are taught. Outside reading choices are determined by the instructor.

Course Objectives:

By the time the student completes this course of study, the student will know or be able to:

- Confidently present information and analysis to the class and evaluate the effectiveness of other types of presentations and their impact on an audience.
- Improve in all areas of composition. Their word choice and sentence variety will be more sophisticated. Arguments will be adequately supported. They will be exposed to timed writing (writing under pressure), which is preparation for the SAT/ACT/AP Testing.
- Discuss literature while distinguishing between fact, opinion, perspective, etc.
- Analyze fiction using appropriate terminology. Students will learn how to write a persuasive analysis by using textual evidence as support.
- Participate in small group and whole-class discussions.
- Respond to writing prompts regarding the reading, their writing, or a particular topic relevant to the class.
- Examine a major theme in relation to/within the context of something they have read in class.
- Analyze image as text, knowing that reading and viewing involve the construction of meaning and that active readers and viewers intentionally engage with the text
- Type essays out of class in various types of writing: response to literature, personal narrative, persuasion, compare/contrast, descriptive, research, and business writing. All typed writing assignments will be in MLA format.
- Use technology in various ways to help develop skills and assess learning progress, including Membean and NoRedInk.

Grading Policy:

Your English semester grades are determined on a weighted point basis.

The weighting is as follows:

Formative Assessment – 24%

• The purpose of Formative Assessment is to offer feedback that guides teaching & learning. Some examples of Formative Assessments are Homework, Quizzes, Participation, Practice Work.

Summative Assessments – 54%

• The purpose of Summative Assessments is to measure learning. Some examples of Summative Assessments are Major Writing Assignments*, Tests, Projects.

Semester Final Exam – 20% of semester grade

*Each major writing assignment takes 20-30 minutes per student to grade. With almost 100 students, expect me to return essays about two weeks after the due date.

Extra Credit – There is no extra credit offered in this class.

Late Work Policy -

 Homework & Participation: Students will be required to complete all assigned work. No busywork is given in this class. The consequence for late work may include break or after-school office hours time to complete work and/or get help. At the teacher's discretion, full or partial credit may be awarded for late work, <u>provided it is no more</u> <u>than two weeks late</u>. No work will be accepted more than two weeks past the due date. Please send an email to the teacher BEFORE class time if you would like to request extra help or extra time on any classwork. (Work turned in with approved extension from the instructor may be awarded full credit.)

• Essays & Major Class Projects: All major essays and long-term projects are due on the due date, regardless of illness or absence. Students will lose 10% for every 24 hours that passes following the deadline for late writing assignments or major class projects, up to 5 days late (-50%). If the assignment has not been completed by the fifth day, the student will be required to make arrangements with the instructor to complete the assignment under supervision before leaving campus that day.

Late Assignments when Absent:

As per our student handbook, students have an amount of time equal to the length of their excused absence to make up missing work and exams. It is the student's responsibility to know what assignment(s) or exam(s) are to be completed and make appropriate arrangements with the instructor. If a student is absent from class due to any school-sponsored event such as a field trip, student council or sporting activity, etc., he/she is required to make arrangements to turn in any work that is due that day on time, get assignments that he/she may miss, and be prepared to take any exams or quizzes on the day that he/she returns to class. In other words, <u>no extra time</u> is given for planned absences such as school-sponsored activities, sports, or vacations. Kairos participants will be granted two weeks after returning to make up work assigned or due during Kairos week. Please make arrangements with the instructor <u>in advance</u> for any planned absences.

Essays:

All out-of-class writing assignments and essays must be **typed**, **double-spaced**, **& Times New Roman**, **12-point font**. All major writing will be submitted through the TurnItIn.com plug-in on Canvas. For in-class hand-written assignments, quizzes, and tests, **blue or black ink** must be used.

Turnitin.com/Canvas/Paper Copies:

Because of the technology provided, much of the work will be turned in to Canvas or TurnItIn.com through Canvas; however, some things need to be printed. Because of this, students are responsible for knowing how and when an assignment is due. It is their responsibility to troubleshoot technology issues, should they exist, and making plans to meet with the teacher ahead of time to ensure that turning in work goes smoothly.

<u>Academic Dishonesty</u> – Students who receive 5 behavioral infractions in one academic school year will be placed on a disciplinary contract. Those who violate their disciplinary contract will be subject to disciplinary consequences up to a board hearing or dismissal. Examples of disciplinary infractions are:

- Cheating
- Inappropriate behavior
- Disrespect/insubordination
- Inappropriate use of social media

- Gum
- Inappropriate language

*Please note that these are just examples and students will receive infractions when warranted.
